

Message from Leadership


- Fortunately, daily cases and hospitalization across Canada and in Quebec continue to come down showing signs that we may be on the other side of the second wave which was much more challenging that the first wave of this Spring. Despite this good news there is reason to be very cautious as news of new variants of the COVID-19 are being identified in the Abitibi region and Montreal, this is what we do know about the new variants:
 - The new variants (UK and South Africa) are more easily transmitted than the original strain of COVID-19;
 - The vaccine is still a valuable tool in combatting the new strains of COVID-19.
- Public Health and local Public Safety officers have determined that it would be advisable to maintain the restriction on non-essential intercommunity travel for at least another 14 days due to the concerns associated with the new variants of COVID-19 and the pre-occupations of authorities over the possibility of a "third wave". It is important to keep in mind that respecting the same measures that got us this far will continue to protect us: physical distancing, hand washing, 14 day precautionary isolations, etc.
- Jurisdictions that have successfully vaccinated high percentages of their populations are seeing a significant reduction in COVID-19.

Travelling

We require 14 days without community transmission before we consider changing the status of a region. Although, neighboring regions are improving more time is required for things to become stable: ALL NON-ESSENTIAL TRAVEL BETWEEN COMMUNITIES IS RESTRICTED AND SUBJECT TO THE 14 DAY MANDATORY SELF-

ISOLATION. (An exception is made for <u>Residents</u> of a community returning home or the transportation of children (under 18) to their parent, who should not be subject to the 14-day mandatory self-isolation).

CAUTION: Travellers are always advised to call ahead and verify the entry restrictions or travel restrictions that may exist at their point of destination or regions that they are transitioning to as conditions can change quickly.



Eeyou Istchee Deconfinement Plan

When it has been 14 days since the last case, a community can consider moving to another phase. There are other considerations that must be taken into account such as the nature of the last case and if it had been completely contact traced or the risk that very close neighboring regions.

PHASE 3

- Outdoor gatherings 75 or 10 households
- Indoor gathering 25 or 3 households (This limitation applies to indoor private gatherings and indoor public events, such as sporting events)
- There is no need to close offices in Eeyou Istchee so long as the proper precautionary measures are maintained.

PHASE 2

- Outdoor gatherings 2 households maximum.
- Indoor gathering same 2 households at all times.
- There is no need to close offices in Eeyou Istchee so long as the proper precautionary measures are maintained.

PHASE 1

- Prohibition on visits or gatherings indoor and outdoor. If someone is not a resident of a home, they should not be in that home. "Visits" includes, cook outs, car rides, etc.
- Public buildings are upon appointment only.
- Access to and from the community is restricted to essential services only.

Vaccination Program

The Cree Nation has achieved 72% of those eligible to be vaccinated and continued efforts are required to get as many people vaccinated as possible to assist in allowing the Cree Nation to return to a more normal life sooner.

It is important to note that even as the Cree Board of Health and Social Services of James Bay makes preparations for the administration of the 2nd dose of the Moderna Vaccine, individuals are encouraged to call their local medical centers to make arrangement to receive the first dose.

As jurisdictions and airlines around the world ask for proof of vaccination, efforts are being made to identify the appropriate "attestation" of vaccination that can be given to recipients of the second dose. Remember you cannot get a second dose until you have had a first dose and the first dose is always available, even when the administration of the second dose has begun.

Many jurisdictions are concerned with a 3rd wave of COVID-19 in association with the emergence of variants of COVID-19 and vaccination will be a very important tool for the Cree Nation in ensuring that a 3rd wave has minimal impact on Eeyou Istchee.

Education

All Mistissini elementary and secondary students continue to learn online this week. The schools are preparing for a safe and gradual return to inclass instruction for next week. All other community schools have returned to in-class instruction and are following Scenario B measures.

A resource page for students and parents needing help setting up their Office 365 accounts, including Teams and Outlook applications, will be available on eeyoueducation.ca soon. Laptop loans for Mistissini high school students continue to be distributed.

Post-Secondary Student Services is working closely with Public Health on a safe plan for PSSS students who wish to visit their communities during their March break.

Sabtuan Adult Student Services is currently reviewing their plan for students to return to the Sabtuan Regional Vocational Training Centre in Waswanipi. Local vocational training programs have all resumed.
