

Message from Leadership

Worldwide countries continue to struggle with trying to control outbreaks and find a path out of the last wave of COVID-19 cases. In Canada, and especially in Quebec, things are improving significantly due to the commitment of Public Health authorities to COVID-19 restrictions and preventative measures and vaccination campaigns. The Government of Quebec has been making important announcements on advancements in deconfinement.

It is worth comparing these announcements to the current situation in Eeyou Istchee:

The comparison above demonstrates that despite changes and announcements on colour codes for regions, we enjoy significantly more freedoms in Eeyou Istchee than anywhere else in Quebec. Despite having a health care system that is more fragile and a population with a high instance of underlying conditions making us particularly vulnerable to COVID-19, the Cree Nation has achieved this enviable status for a number of important reasons:

- The coordination between all levels of Cree leadership: Regional, Local, Entities at both the political and administrative levels.
- The incredible efforts of the Cree Health Board and participation of the Cree people in the vaccination campaign: 63.8% 12 and older; 89.9% 18 and over with a first dose and 46.6% of the population with 2 doses.
- The commitment of the residents of our communities to the local isolation requirements. The local laws and their administrations are the single most important distinguishing factors of the Cree Nation from other jurisdictions. This has allowed us to deconfine within our communities much quicker than other jurisdictions.

Although there are no changes in the assessment at this time of other regions, the Public Health Department and the local Public Safety Officers are working on a new formula for assessing when travellers from other regions can be considered for exemptions from local isolation requirements:

- The Cree Nation vaccination rate;
- The vaccination rate in a specific region; and
- The percentage of active cases per 100,000 residents of the concerned region.

If regions throughout Quebec continue to improve at the current rate, important changes can be expected next week. Again, the commitment of the Cree Nation to the vaccination campaign, the vigilance of local Public Safety Officers and the resilience of the residents of our communities to do everything they can to protect the vulnerable communities is what is responsible for the enviable position that the Cree Nation finds itself in regard to COVID-19 today.

Recommended Isolation Periods

Vaccinated: Individuals who have received two	Seven (7) Days
(2) doses of a Public Health approved vaccine	. , .
Non-Vaccinated	Ten (10) Days


The recommendations of the Public Health Department are based on scientific evidence and a thorough risk assessment. Should a community not wish to follow differentiated isolation periods local Governments must follow the most conservative recommendation. For example, ten (10) days for the current situation.

Allowing unvaccinated individuals to isolate only seven (7) days, during this time where variants pose a risk and there is still a risk of an outbreak as we try and initiate the vaccination of children it is not advised and puts community members at an unreasonable risk.

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Within Eeyou Istchee:

- any forestry camp
- Windfall Mining Exploration Site of Osisko Mining Inc;
- Renard Mine Site of Stornoway;
- Éléonore Mine Site of Newmont
- Wallbridge Mining Exploration Site of Fenelon

These four mining companies have testing protocols that allow workers to be exempt from local Mandatory Self-Isolation Laws.

CAUTION: Every community has their own procedure for applying for entry into the community and travellers are always advised to call ahead and verify the entry procedure or travel restrictions that may exist at their point of destination or regions that they are transitioning to as conditions can change quickly.

Eeyou Istchee Deconfinement Plan

PHASE 4

- Outdoor gatherings 150 maximum
- Indoor gatherings 50 maximum There are protocols available for larger organized indoor gatherings from the Public Health Department
- Offices and places of business are open with precautionary measures carefully maintained

PHASE 3

- Outdoor gatherings 75 or 10 households
- Indoor gathering 25 or 3 households (This limitation applies to indoor private gatherings and indoor public events, such as sporting events)
- There is no need to close offices in Eeyou Istchee so long as the proper precautionary measures are maintained.

PHASE 2

- Outdoor gatherings 2 households maximum.
- Indoor gathering same 2 households at all times.
- There is no need to close offices in Eeyou Istchee so long as the proper precautionary measures are maintained.

PHASE 1

- Prohibition on visits or gatherings indoor and outdoor. If someone is not a resident of a home, they should not be in that home. "Visits" includes, cook outs, car rides, etc.
- Public buildings are upon appointment only.
- Access to and from the community is restricted to essential services only.

The consent form is needed for confidentiality purposes. A valid ID is to ensure the Proof of Vaccination is sent to the right person. A valid email or postal address is required in order to receive your proof, it is not possible to obtain the proof of vaccination from your local CMC.

EDUCATION

- Following consultation with public health, Cree School Board schools moved into Scenario A on Monday, June 7. Cloth face coverings are now permitted for students, and students may remove their coverings while in class with stable groups. Procedural masks are still required for school employees (teachers may remove their masks when teaching from a 2 metre distance with their stable groups).
- Adult education facilities are also in Scenario A. Students may now remove their procedural masks when they are in class at a 2 metre distance.
- Vaccination clinics for youth aged 12-17 at our schools are ongoing.
 We would like to acknowledge our school employees for their help in supporting these clinics. We would also like to thank the hardworking team at public health for making these vaccinations available to Cree School Board students.
