SUBJECT: Removal of Canadian Flags in light of Indian Residential Schools Revelations

Dear Colleagues,

We have heard increasing calls to cancel Canada Day celebrations this year in light of the tragic discovery of more than one thousand unmarked graves – and counting – at former Indian residential schools sites across Canada. We, as a Cree Nation, have been profoundly shaken by these recent revelations and we have mourned the little ones that were lost and have sent prayers to their families and their communities. These past few weeks were a somber reminder of this country's not-so-distant past and clearly demonstrates the need for Canada to deal with its colonial past before we can collectively heal as a Nation.

As such, this year, we respectfully invite all Cree First Nations to stand in solidarity with all the victims and survivors of residential schools, their families and community members, by taking down their Canadian flags for the month of July. The removal of the flags for a month is a symbolic way to honour the memories of all the children lost at residential schools and serves as an opportunity for all of us to reflect on the tragic legacy of residential schools and the impacts that can still be felt in all our communities to this day.

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It is also our hope that during this time we can begin to reflect upon our collective actions as we respond to these troubling revelations so we can move forward and find ways for our communities to heal. We will continue our work to ensure that any actions taken are done right and done in the right way.
