

STATUS OF CASES

Recently there have been **three (3)** active cases within Region 18 – Eeyou Istchee. All cases were identified and isolated through the different protocols in Eeyou Istchee, for example getting tested on day five (5) when arriving from an Area of Risk.

Vaccination Campaign

Vaccination for children 5-12 will begin November 22nd, 2021.

Booster (3rd dose) shots will be made available in the Cree communities of Eeyou Istchee within the coming weeks.


EDUCATION

Cree School Board buildings remain closed to the general public. Employees in all facilities continue to follow public health measures, including completing daily health checks and wearing face coverings in shared areas.

Youth sector schools are working in collaboration with public health to support vaccination efforts in schools/communities where higher vaccination rates are needed.

Deconfinement in Eeyou Istchee v. Quebec in General

TRAVEL TO EYYOU ISTCHEE FROM AN AREA OF RISK

Partially vaccinated or unvaccinated

10 Days Isolation

AND

Test Between Day 5 -7*

Fully vaccinated

2-Meter Distancing

OR

Mask

(indoor and outdoor)

AND

Test Day 5*

**Please contact your local CMC to schedule a COVID-19 test.*

Note: The change in travel restrictions is subject to approval by local Councils. It is important to verify the status of restrictions in your community of destination before travelling.

Examples*:

- Fully vaccinated post-secondary student, anyone returning home or a contractor from an Area of Risk such as Gatineau **WILL NOT** need to isolate.
- Non-fully vaccinated post-secondary student, anyone returning home or a contractor from an Area of Risk such as Montreal (Montreal is currently an Area of Risk) **WILL** need to isolate for 10 days.
- Fully vaccinated parents returning home from an Area of Risk such as Quebec City (Quebec City is currently an Area of Risk) with children or family members that are not fully vaccinated: The parents **WILL NOT** need to self-isolate but the non-fully vaccinated children or family members **WILL** need to self-isolate for 10 days.
- Fully vaccinated parents returning home from Toronto (Toronto is currently an Area of Risk) with non-fully vaccinated children at home who didn't travel with their parents: The parents who travelled and the children who did not travel **WILL NOT** need to self-isolate and may continue to attend school or daycare.

** The above are examples using current Areas of Risk. Please consult the map to verify Areas of Risk before travelling.*




Effective as of Tuesday November 9, 2021 at 11:59PM

- Partially or unvaccinated : 10 days isolation, plus COVID-19 test between day 5 to 7.





TRAVEL OUTSIDE EEYOU ISTCHEE

PROOF OF VACCINATION (Vaccine Passport/Vaxicode):

Proof of vaccination/vaccine passport (Vaxicode) is required to access certain non-essential public areas (restaurants, movie theaters, etc.) in Quebec.

AIR AND RAIL TRANSPORT

Effective October 30th, 2021, the Ministry of Transport of Canada has ordered that proof of full vaccination will be required for air and rail travel. This could impact those that use air travel to travel to work sites such as Stornoway, Eleonore or other fly-in sites.
